Hana Konvalinková is a student at Palacky University in Olomouc in the Eastern part of the Czech Republic. She attended the Scottish Universities Summer School course on 20th Century British Literature with an emphasis on the cultural and political climate of the period and its influence. She writes:

"in my seminar group there were twelve students from Spain, Italy, USA, Serbia, Holland and Russia and it was very interesting to see how everyone brought forth their own academic and cultural background. The afternoons were free, so that we could pursue our own studies. The chance to use the Edinburgh University library was a marvellous experience and I had access to materials I could never have got hold of in the Czech Republic. I was happy to find numerous books and articles on Katherine Mansfield. I learned more about her life and works than I could ever have hoped."


But life was not all toil since the experience of being in Scotland is itself essential:

"We went on a bus tour of Edinburgh, visited the National Gallery of Modern Art and the Dean Gallery, and further afield visited Glasgow and Loch Lomond. At the end we had a wonderful party but were a wee bit sad because the three weeks were over and we were saying goodbye to our new friends. I found I benefited on the personal level just as much and in our endless talks gained an insight, though moderate, into other cultures than my own."

Hana Kosová is studying at the Charles University in Prague. She also attended the Summer School course on 20th century British Literature. She writes:

"Another important aspect was the theoretical approach to the subject matter. Czech universities have a strong tradition of literary structuralism and not many new trends in literary theory have been accepted. So the mostly postmodern approach added even more attraction to the course for me personally."

When Hana attended the Summer School the Edinburgh festival was in full swing.

Hana enjoyed the experience in Edinburgh saying:

"I come from Prague which is as well a centre of cultural life. I really appreciated being in the middle of things. It is always different to read about the Festival in a book or paper from the actual living in the city at the time. I can imagine that local people could feel it as something disturbing but for me it was another experience."

Zuzana Kasaková also from Charles University attended the Summer School course on Modern Scotland and writes:

"I found the Summer School course very interesting and it widened and deepened my knowledge especially in the field of art and literature. During lectures we could discuss issues and problems and it was interesting to compare different points of view. I gained a lot of information concerning Scottish devolution and the way the Scottish Parliament works. Visits to different places in Edinburgh were important for comprehending Scottish life and thinking. Also I would like to express my gratitude for the books I received from your Fund. They are priceless for my studies."

We also received very positive feedback from the course organisers who remarked that our students were very fluent in English and equally able and diligent achieving substantial amounts of private research. All in all we were very impressed by the students and look forward to renewing the experience this year.

The committee was pleased to be able to assist the Charles University in the provision of a number of books both new and second hand for the study of Scottish literature and culture.

Fund Raising

The 17th March 2000 was the day of the launch reception when we took over Edinburgh University's Talbot Rice Gallery. Our guest speakers were Professor Ian Campbell of Edinburgh University's department of Victorian and Scottish Literature and Counsellor Minister Milan Coupek of the Czech Embassy in London.

After the initial welcome and speeches there followed fund raising events (tombola and auction) to the accompaniment of light refreshments and the musical requests played by Victor Pechar and Jean Eggar including those with distinct national themes (both Czech and Scottish).

The evening was a great success, not only in terms of numbers attending, and raised over eight hundred pounds.

Throughout the year our secretary, Alena Linhartová, and her helpers, notably Olga Franks, have worked tirelessly fund raising in various ways and at various places running stalls and car boot sales. As a result the Fund has been able to raise many hundreds of pounds.
